	Ngā Tajāte
Wāhanga 1	He whakamāramatanga mō te kaupapa: Students will be exposed to a range of written text types, analysing the language used and exploring how language is manipulated for a specific purpose to target specific audiences. Students will appreciate how ideas are developed within a structured text, follow appropriate text conventions and apply this appreciation to their own crafted writing. They will produce the first piece of writing for their writing portfolio in (3.4) 91475. This kaupapa will also lay the foundation for AS91474, the exam at the end of the year. Students will begin their reading of an extended written text in preparation for the external, AS 91472 and to contribute to their As AS91478
Wāhanga 2	He whakamāramatanga mō te kaupapa: Students will resume their exploration of the written text from W1, and write an essay based on this. It may contribute to AS91478 Students will study a selection of four visual and/or written texts. They will identify significant aspects of text which connect these four, and critically analyse these- AS91478 . Students can choose to present their analysis for assessment against AS 91475, AS 91476 or AS 91477 .
Wāhanga 3	He whakamāramatanga mō te kaupapa: Students will use the texts studied in the previous term to identify a literature or language topic of interest to them which they will research. They will learn how to form a hypothesis, find relevant and reliable secondary sources, then synthesise this information to form new understandings of their topic in relation to their hypothesis. Students will learn how to present this information in a suitable format, with appropriate referencing. There is the opportunity to present this either as part of the writing portfolio AS 91475, as an oral presentation AS 91476 or as a visual/verbal essay AS 91477.
Wāhanga 4	He whakamāramatanga mō te kaupapa: This term will focus on the revision and consolidation of the content and skills required to pass the external assessments.
